
WELCOME NEW BOARD MEMBERS

Collections Spotlight

With the help of our two summer interns, huge strides have been made on two exhibits needing extensive object documentation as part of the IMLS *Inspire!* Grant. More on that project is in another part of the newsletter, but we wanted to share one of the many examples of a "What's Old is New" Collection Spotlight that were among over 600 objects in the Pharmacy Exhibit.

Toward the corner of one of the back cases is a package of five epinephrine hydrochloride shots. Most of us know a similar modern version by the name EpiPen. When epinephrine was first extracted from the adrenal glands by biochemist Jokichi Takamine in 1901, the medical and scientific community realized the compound could be used to treat organ failure in humans as a result of severe and sudden allergic reactions. A synthesized version was soon developed and epinephrine became available in vials, to be administered in an accompanying syringe, to those at elevated risk. Owners of the early kits would have to measure out the right dose on the spot and inject themselves - a process that was not easy in a life or death situation. Premeasured doses arrived during World War II, as demand increased to aid injured soldiers in healing and recovery. While no longer a race against time, the process still wasn't easy. To administer a dose, the user had to jab the needle at least halfway into a sterilized portion of the



arm. It was then necessary to bend the rubber portion of the device, breaking the stopper and allowing for the proper amount to enter the body.

For those needing epinephrine in Sheboygan County during the mid 20th century, there were only a few retailers. It



was exclusively sold by pharmaceutical companies, who often would lend local shops their brand. The Roenitz Drug Store, a Rexall branded pharmacy, was located at 516 N. 8th Street. After graduating in 1891, Herman Roenitz worked for the Neumeister Drug Store before purchasing their interest. Roenitz's pharmacy was known in the early days as the "deutsche apothecary" since they could fill German language prescriptions. The Roenitz Drug Company continued to grow over the next century, eventually purchasing another area pharmacy and operating five locations.

We will also be hosting the Wisconsin Historical Society's traveling poster exhibition *We Will Always Be Here: Wisconsin's LGBTQ+ Historymakers*. Featuring artwork by nipinet landsem, the newest traveling exhibit from WHS, *We Will Always Be Here* explores the profiles of eight individuals across a wide spectrum of identities who have helped to empower others to make a positive change in the world. AN IMLS INSPIRE! GRANT UPDATE

As you read this newsletter, we are nearing the one-year mark of receiving the IMLS Inspire! grant to begin work on the first complete inventory of the Historical Society's collection of artifacts. These artifacts are the foundation for the exhibits, programs, stories, and more that happen every day here at the Museum. Even though countless hours were spent creating a roadmap for the project, like any good journey, there have been small detours along the way. Some have been welcome, while a few have left us wishing that construction season wasn't perennial around here. With a year under our belts, we thought it might be time for an update!

There are many ways to reflect on the benefits of a collection inventory. If you love numbers, here are a few -

- Objects that we have "laid our hands on" 2,741
- Object photographs added 5,262 (*estimated, but it is a LOT)
- Exhibits with all objects documented 20 out of 22 (we started at 10)

While this project has significant benefits for the staff here at the Museum, ultimately, the inventory will have the greatest benefit for all of you - our community! The collection is part of Sheboygan County's story - we hold these

items in the public trust not only to learn about the past but to help guide us into the future. Knowing exactly what we have makes it easier to create more access to the collection, both through displays, but also in response to things like research or reference requests. Additionally, new technology will allow us to increase access via technology. It also helps to identify the areas in which we need to increase our efforts to make sure the collection is representative of our community as a whole - we are already starting to identify the areas in which the collection will need to expand to provide a more complete picture.



This is also an opportunity for us to thank our two summer interns,

Elaina Nelson and John Weakley, for all of their assistance with this project. While Becca's grant funded, two-year position is a key part of the progress on the grant, having the four extra hands this summer has truly been an example of many hands makes light work, or at least many hands makes more progress.
