

# EDUCATION UPDATE

The educational programs for the 2022-23 have been completed with the end of the school year calendar. During the course of the school year, seventeen different public schools were in attendance at the four Educational Programs representing seven school districts from across Sheboygan County. There were also eleven different private schools from Sheboygan County that attended our Educational Programs from grades 2 through 5. We had110 different classes and a total of 2275 students in attendance for the 2022-23 school year.

While the school year has come to end, we are already moving forward preparing for next year. We hope to have a Middle School Program on the Industrial Revolution piloted for the 2023-24 school year. Special thanks to Board member and SASD administrator Jim Renzelmann and teachers Mary Meyers-Wenninger (Urban) and Emma Robeson (Horace Mann) for their participation as consultants for this new endeavor.

SCM continues its involvement with National History Day. The NHD contest will be coming up in June. It will be the first time the national contest will be in person in three years due to the pandemic. There are about 60 students from the state of Wisconsin participating in this global event. I'd like to personally thank Dale Robson for his many years of service to the Educational Program at the SCM. He has been a great mentor to me over the past several months and will be greatly missed.

## **COLLECTION SPOTLIGHT**

Our May 2023 Collection Spotlight continues our celebration of the Historical Society's Centennial year with a beautiful floral display. It also represents the growth of the collection beginning in the 1950s, including an early example of "modern" collecting undertaken by the Society, with the addition of a historically contemporary piece and the expansion beyond pioneer era artifacts.

Donated in 1956 by Mrs. Charlotte M. Kohler, this floral cocktail dress with matching shoes was worn by the First Lady of Wisconsin to a Governor's Conference. Mrs. Kohler served as First Lady of Wisconsin from 1951 through 1957 following the election of her husband ,Walter J. Kohler Jr., to the governorship in November 1950. As First Lady, Kohler became an admired volunteer with the American Red Cross and spearheaded the establishment of a fund to support Christmas gifts for patients of Mendota State Hospital.

Born in Philadelphia, Charlotte McAleer Kohler (1912-1995) spent her early years on the East Coast. Following her marriage to Walter Kohler in 1948, she settled in Sheboygan County. The donation of her cocktail dress to the Historical Society represented one of the first instances of contemporary collecting for the organization, a practice of adding items to the collection of the recent past. It also was an early addition of modern women's fashion pieces as opposed to the clothing of the "pioneer woman." Kohler donated a number of formal dresses from her time as First Lady to Wisconsin historical organizations, including giving the Wisconsin Historical Society the dress she wore to



the inauguration of President Dwight Eisenhower.

Kohler's dress, along with 99 other objects, are on display at the Museum through October 22 as part of our Centennial exhibit, 100 Years/ 100 Objects: A Century of Collecting. Stop by to learn more about how the Museum's collection changed and grew over the decades, including more examples of contemporary collecting and representations of the changing times.

## WE'LL MISS YOU!

Dale came to the Society and Museum as a volunteer in 1993, following his wife Louise who became an employee a year prior. He volunteered when needed those early years which eventually led to him being hired in April 1995 as custodian. At that time, the museum did not include our main building so custodial duties were a bit easier. For the next decade he kept the museum clean and also assisted with programs and other pro-

jects. In 2010, he was hired as the Education Program Liaison and Facilitator using his 30 + years as a high school English teacher to enhance and grow the education programs. His responsibilities shifted to keeping the museum's connection with area educators strong by providing them information on our programs, both what they are and what to prepare before bringing students to the program. He also became the museum's in-house editor of all things written. A few years after assuming his new role, he stepped away from the custodial duties, mentioning that when he started as custodian there were only two toilets and sinks in two bathrooms, but now (2013) there are 10 toilets, nine sinks and four urinals on top of the normal cleaning. Dale has experienced a lot of growth at the museum in his time, always remaining committed to our mission and education of our area students. Thank you, Dale!
