

MIDDLE SCHOOL OUTREACH PROGRAM LAUNCHES



The Sheboygan County Museum is excited to launch the new Middle School Educational Program *The Technology Revolution and Sheboygan County*. Staff, along with the assistance of teachers from the Sheboygan Area School District, designed this outreach program primarily for 8th grade students where they identify, discuss, and analyze artifacts that we bring to the schools. The program teaches students critical 21st Century skills and critical thinking.

This outreach series engages students through the school year. The first of three sessions were

completed by museum staff and volunteers in September. The second session occurs in January and February, while the third session typically wraps up the series in May.

Session one focuses on Historical Context in the areas of Culture, Communication and Transportation. Session two primarily focuses on manufacturing and industry in Sheboygan County. The third session explores the Information Age and beyond. Fourteen different classes at Urban and Horace Mann are participating this school year.

DIRECTORS NOTE

The Sheboygan County Museum has been busy building foundations for the future. Some are visible, while others are more structural. In early October, a contractor installed a new roof on the Cheese Factory. Over the past 6 years, water collected in a large plastic underbed shoe bin. After every rainstorm, a staff member climbed a ladder into the attic and removed the water with a hand pump and bucket. It was definitely time to get this fixed.

In October, Matt Bayens, Erin Brehmer, and the Education volunteers welcomed students back. The Museum has a well-deserved reputation for engaging 1st- 5th grade audiences. After a visit to



the Museum, students have a better understanding of what makes Sheboygan County unique while also preparing them to become future engaged citizens.

The Museum also recently kicked off work on a new strategic plan during a staff retreat at Lakeland University. In general, a strategic plan helps define and provide structure for where an organization is headed. The Sheboygan County Museum board and staff are committed to building the foundation for the museum to increase our impact.

Prior to the retreat, our Strategic Planning Committee sent a survey to all staff and board members. Common responses focused our conversations on three important topics: 1) increase community engagement, 2) develop our staff, and 3) increase revenue. After many beneficial discussions, the museum developed a framework for a three year strategic plan that is flexible while also providing a path forward. We still have a lot of work to do, but we are excited to share the finished Strategic Plan in 2025.

Whether simple or complex, we are building foundations to make our organization and the community we serve stronger.

COLLECTION SPOTLIGHT

History doesn't repeat itself, but it often rhymes. Whether the quote was truly ever spoken by Mark Twain, or perhaps another, our October 2024 Collection Spotlight reminds us that there is truth in the idea. If you have been following the local news of late, you may have heard that the Hi-Ho Bottling Company of Plymouth has been brought back to life nearly 80 years after the first founding in 1945. The name is not the only coincidence.

Using a private label based on the first two letters of their last names, Donald Holzschuh and Joseph Hildebrand created Hi-Ho to offer soda in a variety of flavors. As a veteran of World War II, Holzschuh was able to receive extra allowances of the still tightly rationed ingredient sugar if it was used for business purposes. Holzschuch soon partnered with Hildebrand, a local business owner with a stake in the Plymouth Springs Bottling Company, and the two established the new company in 1945.

Though Hi-Ho Bottling Company of Plymouth was a late entry into the Sheboygan County soda water business, the two found success in their business. In 1948, a case of their soda could be purchased for one dollar, plus the bottle deposit, compared to \$1.25 for the equivalent of Coca-Cola. The bottles, designed by Henry Weber, utilized pyroglazing to create a colorful and joyful label that not only carried the soda, but added an air of light hearted visual advertising. Like many sodas of the day, all flavors came in the same style bottle and the bottle cap was used to differentiate the varieties.

The company also sponsored a local bowling team, the Hi-Ho Sodas, for a number of years. By 1949, Hildebrand left the partnership and Holzschuh continued on, adding sales and deliveries to his bottling responsibilities. In 1955, Holzschuh sold the business. For many years, the reminders of the soda manufacturer were found on old bottles and shipping crates, until the Plymouth Walldogs added a large Hi-Ho mural to the outside of the original business location at 120 E. Mill Street.

In 2023, local Iraq War veteran Tyler Rezachek encountered the Hi-Ho story at a silent auction for Plymouth Historical Society and feeling an immediate sense of connection, Rezachek decided to bring back the brand. Rezachek was soon joined by partners Leonid Bortsov and Ryan Schroeder and within a few short months, the new Hi-Ho Soda was up and running, with four favorite Wisconsin flavors featuring local honey. While this particular Collection Spotlight features an original Hi-Ho glass bottle, we can't wait to add a few of the newer Hi-Ho Soda cans to the Museum collection.

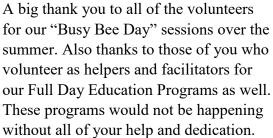
K-12 EDUCATION PROGRAM UPDATE
